# OCEAN COUNTY **COLLEGE** prepares nurses for the future.

The School of Nursing and Health Sciences is a well-respected program that has been sought by health care facilities to provide nursing care in a dynamic and constantly changing environment.

TOMS RIVER, NJ – They call it "the baby". It is designed for the simulation and practice of a range of infant patient care procedures. It allows for the recognition of normal and abnormal heart, breath, bowel and vocal sounds. This is one of the many life-like patient simulators available to nursing students at Ocean County College's School of Nursing. These manikins are just some of the state-of-the-art equipment that offer effective and powerful hands-on practice that prepare nursing students for the future.

Leading the helm of the School of Nursing and Health Sciences is Dean Teresa (Tracy) Walsh, Ph.D., MSN, RN. Dr. Walsh serves at the same institution where she began her nursing career. She believes OCC's nursing faculty provided her with a strong educational foundation, support, mentorship and challenging experiences as she prepared to enter the nursing profession.

She has been a dedicated leader at OCC for many years, and in March 2020, when the Governor's Executive Order forced the campus to close, she quickly and efficiently formulated a plan to shift to a virtual setting to assist OCC's nursing students.

Now in her 40th year as a nurse and making rounds at many local hospitals and educational institutions, Dr. Walsh credits OCC's School of Nursing for giving her the foundation and skillset required to grow in leadership. "As soon as I received my bachelor's degree, I became a nurse educator," she said. "I received a master's degree and certification as a Nurse Practitioner, however never practiced in this role as I loved education more."

Dr. Walsh eventually circled back to OCC in 2006 to serve in a faculty position for three years before transitioning into the role of Director of Nursing Education at Kimball Medical Center (now Monmouth Medical Center South). She later returned to OCC in the summer of 2012 to serve as the Dean of Nursing and Health Sciences. At that time, Dr. Walsh was transitioning nursing students throughout the campus since the healthcare building was closed due to renovations. A few months later, Superstorm Sandy devastated the Jersey Shore. Thankfully, all the students and staff were safely accounted for, but this started talks of a new building. The \$18.5M, H. Hovnanian Health Sciences Building eventually opened in May 2018.

Utilizing this state-of-the-art building, OCC has been able to build simulation into every nursing level with debriefing and peer review. These simulation labs are designed to provide an immersive, state-of-the-art learning experience for healthcare practitioners and students. A simulation center, which consists of realistic looking clinical sim lab rooms, manikins and equipment, allow students to practice and develop clinical expertise without risking the patient.

"At OCC, nursing students are introduced to a real-world experience in a controlled clinical setting supervised by nursing simulation specialists and faculty," said Dr. Walsh. "This allows our nursing students to become confident in high-pressure situations and gain experience that they otherwise would not have during clinicals."





## **Program Spotlight**

As a member of the Ocean County College Foundation Board, David C. Wintrode and The Wintrode Family Foundation is passionate about higher education and ensuring continued individual and professional success in today's world. OCC has been serving the community by providing residents with quality, affordable education and enriching cultural opportunities since 1964. In this issue of The Causeway Gazette, we would like to highlight the OCC School of Nursing and Health Sciences.

Looking back since OCC's nursing program was first established in 1966, Dr. Walsh can attest to how the program has flourished through the years and is highly noted for its excellence in nursing education and student learning. Those interested in OCC's nursing program can select one of three different paths to obtain an Associate Degree (AAS) in Nursing leading to the RN:

- The Traditional Nursing Program admits 90 students for the fall and 90 students for the spring semesters. Students can choose day or evening lectures that are held two days per week. Clinical experiences are one day per week. To meet clinical objectives, clinical experiences can be spread throughout southern NJ. Students must show Ocean County residency.
- The On-site Online Nursing Program is a unique full-time selective program that is designed for students who attend clinical, face-to-face, one day per week with the balance delivered online. "This program is ideal for those who are working (part time is recommended) or have significant family responsibilities, however the program is rigorous and requires discipline on the part of the student to study on the subsequent days," said Dr. Walsh. "Healthcare experience is a requirement. Students are admitted to the Fall semester only and are selected by a committee."
- The Career Mobility Nursing Program is an alternate program for qualified, practicing LPN's. This is a selective program that will admit qualified candidates to Nursing 2 (usually on-site online in the spring semester) after testing out of Nursing 1 is achieved. All nursing general education requirements and a passing TEAS score must be completed before applying for Career Mobility.



In addition to these three pathways, there are a variety of healthcare courses and certificate programs available at OCC. "Whether you are seeking to advance your healthcare career or are interested in pursuing a new field, the Workforce and Professional Education (WPE) can help you achieve your goals," said Kimberly Malony, Alumni and Advancement Director.

A few of these alternate/certificate programs include:

- Medical Coding Professional Certificate
- Certified Clinical Medical Assistant
- Certified Electronic Health Record Specialist Certificate
- Certified Medication Aide
- Dental Assisting
- EKG Technician
- Pharmacy Technician
- Phlebotomy Technician Medical Terminology (AHMT) Holistic Health and Wellness (HHAW)



The School of Nursing and Health Sciences offers a career day every semester. "During the last career event, we had 29 vendors, 35 representatives and 105 students come through with resumes in hand," said Dr. Walsh. "It really was an exceptional day."

Once a student graduates from the School of Nursing, the real journey begins. "We work very closely with students to make sure they take their licensure exams and then we work with facilities in the area to help get them placed as a staff nurse," said Dr. Walsh.

After graduation, OCC's School of Nursing continues to mentor its alumni. "Dr. Walsh is truly a figure head for the OCC Nursing program," said Malony. "Her relationships with students very often continue as they transition to our successful alumni. From the point of entry, you become a part of this community."

"We want our students to succeed in all their endeavors," said Dr. Walsh. "At OCC, we promise to be there to advocate and support our students and alumni to ensure they are well-prepared to practice within a dynamic and constantly changing environment."



An art program, co-sponsored by the Ocean County Artists' Guild, was initiated on February 18. An artist and art instructor, Kimberly A. Cesaretti and AnnMarie Izzi, a registered art therapist, presented the program. Kim and



AnnMarie have extensive experience in art and art education.

They knew how to bring out the artist in the children. They encouraged them to imagine their perfect day and then draw it. After students sketched their dreams, they painted them. Such ideas as a rainbow, a futuristic land, a Great Adventure ferris wheel, building layouts, and a streetscape with buildings in vivid colors jumped off the page. Talent and enthusiasm were the words of the day! This program will be continued every other Friday through mid-June, and we are already planning our next series of art classes!

On Monday, February 21, Hearts of Mercy partnered with the Boston and New York City High School Movement that was hosted by CRU's Fastbreak Conference at Harvey Cedars to provide a picnic at Lexington Park, Barnegat. Lunch was donated by Wawa. Children played basketball, threw a football, played on the swings, and generally enjoyed the day with the older children and adults from New York City and Boston. This is the second year that CRU and Hearts of Mercy have partnered in this activity to reach out to the youth in the area.

Our Spring Break Native Plant Garden Experience was April 19 at Cloverdale Farm County Park from 1:00 to 2:30. This is a hands-on, interactive experience for our children, families, and volunteers to discover and learn about native plants, pollinating insects, and how to care for and maintain a nature garden. We teamed up with Ocean County Parks and Recreation for this activity, which will be facilitated by Patricia Transferini, a Naturalist. The children and other participants planted a butterfly garden with milkweed plants, weeding the garden, and mulching it. This is Hearts of Mercy's second Monarch Butterfly Waystation. Our first is located at the Barnegat Community Garden in Meadowedge Park.

If you have an interest in the milkweed plant and the life of a Monarch Butterfly, we can all take part in helping this majestic species by planting milkweed.

Patricia Transferini will be a guest speaker during a tutoring session. She plans to bring animal furs, skulls, and other knick knacks related to animal families to share with the children. What fun! # HOW FAMILY CAREGIVERS CAN FIND JOY THROUGH UNDERSTANDING DEMENTIA

When my father began to slowly succumb to Alzheimer's, one of the saddest things about it was our inability to talk about the situation as a family. His slow slide into darkness was the elephant in the room. We longed for him to be transparent about what was happening so that we could remove some of the anxiety for all of us, especially him.

As my dad moved into his mid-70s, his judgment and cognitive abilities began to rapidly decline. During summers, when our extended family lived in nearby homes and came together, my sisters and I devised a plan to ease my mother's caregiving duties and keep him occupied. After breakfast, she'd send him down the road to one of my sisters, and after that he'd walk up the road to my house for more conversation and coffee. At some point during our chat, his shoulders would sag. "This is so hard," he would say, tears filling his eyes, but he would never speak the name of his disease, would never acknowledge what was happening.

And so we all sat, locked in our inability to truly find joy with my father in his final years. Maybe if we had done more homework, understood more about the disease, we would have been better at anticipating things and experimenting more.

### A new approach

When I saw the book Living in the Moment: A Guide to Overcoming Challenges and Finding Moments of Joy in Alzheimer's Disease and Other Dementias by Elizabeth Landsverk, M.D., with Heather Millar, I was interested to learn how joy was even possible while watching a loved one being erased by such a cruel illness.

Landsverk, 61, a San Francisco-based doctor who is board certified in internal, geriatric and palliative care medicine, helps caregivers and families ease the journey with dementia and Alzheimer's. As one of only about 3,500 full-time practicing geriatricians in the U.S., she addresses the most challenging medical, behavioral and financial/legal issues and is often the person called in to help work with families when other doctors or approaches have

"It's possible for elders and their families to live fulfilling lives after a dementia diagnosis," Landsverk says. "I wrote this book to give families a straightforward map and toolbox for the road ahead."

### **Understand changing needs**

There is no one-size-fits-all solution when it comes to dementia, according to Landsverk. Each family or person needs to decide what works best for their loved one and their own situation. She reminds us that a person with dementia is still a grownup with feelings, needs and wants just like anyone else. They want to make choices about what they do and what they eat, even though they may not be able to voice their desires. "Even while their abilities are diminishing, they are still an adult," says Landsverk.

People with dementia aren't trying to be difficult. They simply may not be consciously aware that they've changed, which is part of the disease. Dementia patients reflect their view of the world, which means they might get angry about little things, like cold coffee, being told they can't do something or feeling coddled. They may also feel like they are a "hostage" if they are unable to participate in activities they used to do, like driving or writing checks.

Landsverk believes that a little bit of knowledge about the disease can make a big difference in how everyone moves forward. Beyond practical issues, such as how to find extra care, the legalities of medical directives and caregiver life skills, I was curious about what we could control by being informed.

"As we age, multiple changes happen in our bodies that affect our health and behavior," says Landsverk. "Most of us have more fat, less body

water, less reserve in the kidneys and liver. We don't process alcohol the way we used to. And our brains begin to change." She stresses the importance of understanding these changes and incorporating a healthy diet along with exercise into every single day to optimize for health.

"There are lots of 'miracle dementia reversing' claims or supplements," Landsverk cautions, but no supplements or vitamins have been proven to slow down or prevent cognitive decline. The

situation changes is one of the fundamental tenets of finding happiness with that person, according to Landsverk.

"They may no longer be able to paint pictures, but perhaps they can make collages. Eating out at a restaurant might result in an angry scene, but a picnic could be a lovely substitute," offers Landsverk. "A night at the ballpark might no longer be possible, but maybe walking around the ballpark before a game or engaging your

### Questions to ask yourself to help find joy for you and your loved one.

- How has your loved one lived life? What are his or her general values and beliefs? What statements did he or she make about growing older and the end of life?
- Before your loved one became sick, what was the most important thing in his or her life? What is most important now? What brings him or her joy?
- Do you have enough help with care? Can your loved one's assets be used to help support care? Who else can assist, from family to local organizations such as your local county division on aging?
- What are your fears for your loved one? What do you hope to avoid? What are your fears for yourself?
- Does your doctor see the bigger picture around this disease? How does your doctor feel about medications and pain management?

Remember: The goal is to find answers that conform to what your loved one would have wanted based on their current actions or past situations.

Global Council on Brain Health advises that a plant-based diet that is rich in fruits and leafy green vegetables is best, and 30 minutes of daily exercise has a positive impact on brain health.

### Finding new joy

Many things can bring joy, including focusing on the "now" with loved ones. "It's finding the ability to live in the moment," says Landsverk. She suggests caregivers start with thinking about what their loved one enjoyed in the past, but not get stuck there. Understanding what brought joy and then modifying those activities as the

loved one in a game of dominoes with others could be pleasurable.'

Landsverk also emphasizes "the joy of connection." Even for people who are no longer verbally responsive, there are ways to enjoy aspects of human interaction and experiences through touch or music. Music is particularly powerful, and our memories of songs reside in a slightly different part of our brains than words. Landsverk has observed people who cannot answer questions sing church hymns perfectly, bringing joy and comfort to all. She recalls a performance by a bongo player at a senior center

where some older adults responded with joyful expressions and by swaying and "singing"

Try to determine what simple activities, including group ones, can still be enjoyed, such as going for a walk, watching children at the park or even just holding hands. The key is to try to keep the person with dementia active and engaged and try to bring them with you until they can no longer handle the situation. "We also need to recognize that giving up some of these traditions will be hard," says Landsverk. "Try not to put yourself in a situation that will make you sad or depressed."

Landsverk adds that "caregivers may grow frustrated, unaware that very simple adjustments to daily routines can sometimes make all the difference for a dementia patient." She reminds us that just like anyone else, people with dementia need meaningful activities to fill their days. The family is in the best position to help them find purpose in their day, even through small things.

### Managing medication

One aspect of her work is helping families recognize that aggressive and agitated behaviors can often be related to medications commonly given for insomnia or anxiety. "Mis-medication can limit the joy of the elder," says Landsverk. "Oftentimes when I take elders off certain medications, they are less confused and agitated, [which allows] them to engage more with family." Getting the dosages right can often mean the difference between the family being able to keep their loved one home longer and the feeling of needing to put them in a nursing home. Equally important, according to Landsverk, is the treatment of pain. This is critical, since a loved one may become angry and withdrawn unless pain is treated appropriately.

### 'Living in the now'

Families and patients need a reason for optimism, according to Landsverk, who has seen families and patients successfully meet the challenges of dementia. "Dignity, grace and even joy are still possible with the relevant information and an integrated plan," she says.

There is a heartbreaking misconception, after families receive a dementia diagnosis, that life for that person won't be worth living. "Nothing could be further from the truth," she says. "Life can still be rich, but it requires that we reconsider some of our assumptions and expectations about day-to-day living and about dementia."

"Living in the 'now' with your loved one means you can still enjoy good times together," says Landsverk. She points out that for some, the quality of family life and the depth of relationships can even improve with dementia. The father who was always busy working now has time for his family; the son is able to spend more time talking with his mother. "Life can continue to bring love, joy and fulfillment."

# **AVOCADOS CAN PROVIDE HEART HEALTH BENEFITS**

Whether cut up in a salad, spread on toast or transformed into a delightful guacamole dip, the latest research suggests a diet that includes a couple helpings of avocado a week can be beneficial to cardiovascular health.

The study, appearing in the Journal of the American Heart Association, found adults eating two or more servings a week (one cup) of the staple of Mexican cuisine have a 16 percent lower risk of cardiovascular disease and 21 percent lower risk of coronary heart disease compared with people who rarely eat avocados. The researchers also determined that the risk of cardiovascular disease was between 16 and 22 percent lower for folks who swapped half a daily serving of margarine, butter, egg, yogurt, cheese, bacon or other processed meats with avocado.

"Our study provides further evidence that the intake of plant-sourced, unsaturated fats can improve diet quality and is an important component in cardiovascular disease prevention," study lead author Lorena S. Pacheco, a postdoctoral research fellow in the nutrition department at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health in Boston, said in a statement.

### What the study did?

Researchers found the association between avocado consumption and cardiovascular health by analyzing data collected over three decades on more than 100,000 men and women in the United States from two long-term health studies: the Nurses' Health Study, which involved 68,786 women, and the Health Professionals Followup Study of 41,701 men. The participants were free of cancer, coronary heart disease and stroke at the start of the studies.

They were followed for about 30 years, during which time they answered dietary

questionnaires every four years and underwent health screenings. Researchers documented 9,185 coronary heart disease events and 5,290 strokes during more than 30 years of follow-up. For this study, researchers focused on avocado consumption.

### Why avocados?

Although the study doesn't directly answer why eating avocados is good for your heart health, a medium-size Hass avocado contains about 13 grams of oleic acid, or about the same as two tablespoons of olive oil. Half an avocado provides up to 20 percent of the daily recommended fiber, 10 percent of potassium, 5 percent of magnesium and 15 percent of folate, according to the researchers.

They note that the avocado is rich in dietary fiber and unsaturated fats, key components of the Mediterranean diet — a dietary pattern focused on fruits, vegetables, grains, beans, fish and other healthy foods and plant-based fats such as olive, canola, sesame and other non-tropical oils — recommended by the American Heart Association.

"These findings are significant because a healthy dietary pattern is the cornerstone for cardiovascular health, however, it can be difficult for many Americans to achieve and adhere to healthy eating patterns," Cheryl Anderson, chair of the American Heart Association's Council on Epidemiology and Prevention and Dean of the Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health and Human Longevity Science at University of California San Diego, said in a statement. "Although no one food is the solution to routinely eating a healthy diet, this study is evidence that avocados have possible health benefits. This is promising because it is a food item that is popular, accessible, desirable and easy to include in meals eaten by many Americans at home and in restaurants."

# WHY IS NEW JERSEY BANNING PLASTIC BAGS? THERE ARE 4.4 BILLION REASONS

4.4 billion.

That's the number New Jersey shoppers should keep in mind, environment advocates say, when they're worried about whether they'll be able to comply on May 4 when retailers can no longer hand out or sell single-use plastic bags at checkout.

It's estimated that New Jerseyans use 4.4 billion plastic bags on an annual basis.

"We don't need a plastic bag for the toothpaste you buy at the pharmacy," said Doug O'Malley, director of Environment New Jersey. "Literally what we use for 15 minutes should not be a scourge on our environment or our communities for generations."

New Jersey's law signed by Gov. Phil Murphy in November 2020 is considered to be among the strongest in the nation. O'Malley said the move, which his group and others have been working towards for years, is part of a global movement to reduce everyone's dependence on plastic.

"You will find plastic bags blowing down the street, you'll find them in trees, you'll find them in waterways," O'Malley said.

Over a 10-year span ending in 2019, volunteers for Long Branch-based Clean Ocean Action have collected nearly 92,000 plastic shopping bags off of New Jersey beaches. And in each of those years, plastic shopping bags were among the group's "dirty dozen" (the 12 items most commonly found during beach sweeps).

"Plastic bags, in particular when they're out in the marine environment, are especially harmful to certain types of marine life," said Alison Jones, watershed program manager for Clean Ocean Action. "It's posing a threat through ingestion, of course. They can also be a threat through entanglement."

Plastic bags do not break down organically. Instead, over time, they break down into much smaller fragments — aka microplastics, which have been on environmentalists' radar for several years.

"They've been found in finfish, they've

But eliminating a source of litter, or reducing been found in shellfish, they've been found oceans, and they've been found in animals as well as humans," said Sylvia Kay, zero waste coordinator for Sierra Club New Jersey.

A study published on March 24 recorded the first evidence of microplastics found in human

"It's a general problem, not just a coastal problem," Kay said.

Kay referred to New Jersey's plastic bag ban as "low-hanging fruit."

"This is an easy step forward to start cutting down on our use of plastic," she said. "We need to learn to reduce and reuse."

# WILDFIRE DANGER IS SHOOTING HIGHER IN NEW JERSEY

New Jersey has entered the most dangerous part of the year for forest

According to State Fire Warden and Forest Fire Service Chief Greg McLaughlin, peak wildfire season, which can feature low humidity and high winds is now underway.

### Why has the danger level increased?

"We have longer days, stronger sun, the fuels on the forest floor dry out quickly, particularly in the Pine Barrens region of the state," he said.

He said even if there's rain on a given morning in the Pine Barrens a fire can break out in the afternoon because the soils are sandy and

they don't have the ability to retain moisture for a long period of time.

McLaughlin said trees are not leafed out yet so there is no shade on the leaves and shrubs that cover the ground in forested areas where fires start. That makes spring a fire season.

He noted most people assume fire danger is highest during the summer when it's hot and they hear about fires in other states but that is not the case unless there are drought

### conditions in. How do wildfires start?

McLaughlin said there's a small percentage of fires caused by lightning strikes, but as much as 99% of wildfires across the country are started by people.

He noted even though New Jersey is the most densely populated state in the nation, 42% of the state is forested and almost half of our homes and other structures are located right next to forests.

"It's those areas that we're most concerned about because we often have to deal with a high complexity of issues, in terms of evacuations, structure protection," he said.

McLaughlin stressed awareness about fire danger at this time of year is key.

"People want to get outside, they want to enjoy the outdoors and we want them to enjoy our parks and forests and get outside and enjoy that but to be careful if they're using fire," he said.


